Ephesus was an ancient Greek city on the coast of Western Asia Minor. It was built in the 10th century BC. During the Greek era it was one of the twelve cities of the Ionian League. The city flourished after it came under the control of the Roman Empire in 129 BC. The city was famed for the nearby Temple of Artemis, which was one of the Seven Wonders of the Ancient World. The Library of Celsus was located in Ephesus and a theatre capable of holding 25,000 spectators. When Augustus became emperor in 27 BC, he made Ephesus the capital of the province of Asia in western Asia Minor instead of Pergamum. Ephesus then entered an era of prosperity, becoming both the seat of the governor and a major centre of commerce.
