Scripture 1 Corinthians 5:5

Historical Note: Hymenaeus

Hymenaeus was a professed Christian who had embraced heresies. He tried to shipwreck the faith of true believers in Ephesus with his teaching (see 2 Timothy 2:16-18). He was excommunicated by the apostle Paul and casted out of the church.

Historical Note: Alexander the Coppersmith

Alexander was a professed Christian who had embraced heresies. He was excommunicated by the apostle Paul and casted out of the church. Paul later tells Timothy that Alexander did him much harm and that the Lord would repay him for his works (see 2 Timothy 4:14).

Biblical Note: Delivered to Satan

The phrase "delivered to Satan" refers to church discipline. The apostle Paul tells the Corinthian church that they are to deliver to Satan the one who has committed adultery with his father's wife (see 1 Corinthian 5:5). The purpose of "being delivered to Satan" or excommunication is to teach the individual the reality of their sin so that they can come to repentance (See 1 Timothy 1:20).
